

What is think aloud?

• Think aloud is a "metacognitive technique or strategy in which a teacher verbalizes thoughts by reading a selection orally, thus modeling the process of comprehension" (Harris & Hodges, 1995, p. 256).



What is expository text?

- New national standards are placing more emphasis on **non-fiction** rather than narrative text that tells a story.
- Expository, or informational, texts contain factual information and include trade books, e-books, websites, newspapers, magazines, and other content area materials (Moss & Loh, 2010).

Research

• Oster (2001) emphasized that the think aloud is a technique in which students verbalize their thoughts and use metacognition (thinking about one's own thinking) to adjust their own reading for greater success in reading comprehension.

Research

• Duke, N.K. & Pearson P.D. (2002) illustrated that effective instruction involves the use of specific strategies as well as the chance to read, discuss, and write about printed text.




Figure 19 TAC TEKS ELA

The **think aloud strategy** supports the objectives for reading comprehension in grades K-12.

Think aloud builds metacognitive reading skills and provides opportunities for self-monitoring and self-directed independent reading.


An average of **3.2 minutes a day** is spent on informational text in the elementary

When to use Think Aloud?

- **Before reading** (I think this information....)
- **During reading** (The chart on p.___ is about...)
- After reading (I understand that this information is important because.....)



How to Perform Think-Alouds

- 1. Select an enjoyable book or piece of text.
- 2. Explain that students should think about the main ideas and details about the print.
- 3. Inform students that details describe how, when, why, where, or what something is.
- 4. Demonstrate how to recognize important details about the print selection.
